

An Interview with Dr White

What were you doing at the time griffin was started?

I was a 3rd year medical student at the (then) London Hospital Medical School when Griffin started; I was the Welfare Officer (previously known as the Housing Officer for the Clubs Union).

What inspired you to start this project?

Peter Mills, a cardiologist and the then Senior President of the Clubs Union, and Simon Lee, a fellow medical student and now a plastic surgeon in Bristol were both instrumental in helping take the project forward. We must not forget the role of the late Lord David Westbury and Lady Ursula Westbury in embracing the project and helping us fund raise – without them it would never have happened. We must also thank the Tudor Trust, a well established charity, for gifting us our first substantial donation which help us on our way.

What challenges did you face?

The major challenges were convincing people that it was a viable idea (most people thought that it would never happen and that we were 'mad' to pursue it!!) and then raising the money to take the project forward.



Is there anyone in particular who was instrumental in helping to set up Griffin?

I was sitting in the Clubs Union office one day in 1988 chatting to the Student
President, Charlie Siderfin, who is a very enthusiastic, charismatic person (now a GP on the Orkney Islands). He suggested that, in order to help students find accommodation in East London, that we asked the local council for a derelict block of flats and that we then raised the money to restore and decorate; and that we shared the building with older people form the local community – the idea was Charlie's, not mine!

Best/funniest memory of Griffin?

 it was a beautiful venue and a lovely evening. Funniest: Lady Westbury's 'F**ked up chicken' that she regularly served us at yearly get-togethers at her home (her words, not mind!).

How do you think Griffin has changed/evolved over the last 35yrs?

I think that when we started we did not really look beyond the first 5 years. We thought that we were doing older people a 'favour.' In reality, there is a symbiotic relationship between students and older people, with the students (and the committee) having just as much to learn and gain from the life experience of the older Shaftesbury residents, as the older residents gain in friendship and fun that the students and events that we provide

How do you think Griffin will change in the next 5-10yrs?

To be honest, I'm not sure – I hope that our ethos will stay true to our founding principles: the bringing together of two generations in mutual friendship and shared experiences

How do you see loneliness and the fight against it in the future?

In many ways, loneliness may get worse – with the digital age, we too often depend on the internet and social media to communicate and as we get older potentially miss out on the opportunity to communicate in person and enjoy close company. Hopefully Griffin has an ongoing role in alleviating the isolation this may cause, and continue to promote friendship and community

Currently an F1 in East London. At Griffin for 3 years.


What does griffin mean to you and what are your
